
Doris' Doodles Babies

Joseph too is then visited by an angel in a dream and told, "Do not fear to take Mary for your wife, for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit; she will bear a son and you shall call his name Jesus; for he will save his people from their sins.' (Matthew 1: 20 - 21)

Both Joseph and Mary were faced with something that had never even been heard of before. Impossible? Ridiculous? Scary? True? Overwhelming? As it became obvious that Mary was pregnant there would be the shame of sex before their marriage. How did they explain things? His death gives us forgiveness and enables us to go into God's presence after our deaths. Had Jesus been conceived in the normal way and was not God's Son then we would not be able to receive forgiveness and would never be good enough to go to Heaven.
